The children also found out their new teachers this week and spent the day with their new teachers doing some lovely, fun activities getting to know them.


#### Year 2

#### Year 4

Writing this week has moved onto non chronological reports where the children have been focusing on the various languages, structures and features needed and Maths continues with our consolidation of fundamental knowledge lessons where this week the focus has been on fractions and decimal numbers.

Thinking Inclusively this week has been around this terms DT project where your little legends have combined their clay skills with electricity understanding from this terms science topic to create light up totem pole night lights.

Continuing with understanding the culture of the Native Americans, the children have been able to research the importance of totem poles within the Native American culture and history of a variety of tribes. This project has also coincided with this terms art topic of making dream catchers which are again used by the Native Americans.



#### Year 5

This week has been a very busy week in Year 5. On Tuesday we walked to the Victory Academy and watched their production of Matilda. It is safe to say that we were blown away by the talent on display! On Wednesday we had Sports Day where lots of fun was had and Year 5's very own Mr Somers won the race that he was in! On Thursday, Year 5 visited their new Year 6 classes for the day. It was great to see them back in class buzzing with excitement having met their new teachers!



In our learning this week we have been focussing on negative numbers in Maths and have been planning and writing a biography of Tutankhamun, one of Ancient Egypt's most famous pharaohs. In Guided Reading we have been very excited to learn about what happens next to Lil, Tulip and Oz in Secrets of a Sun King.

#### Year 6

Another busy week in the Year 6 calendar. This week has been full of Oliver rehearsals, prop making and little bit of Maths and English in there for good measure.

This week in Maths, Year 6 have been creating Arithmetic challenges for the children to use all fouroperations used in Year 6. Some of the challenges created by the children were as advanced as using of the algebraic expressions combined with geometrical formulas for perimeters and areas for

quadrilateral shapes. We have also continued our text, 'Holes', continuing to unpick the complexities of expectation vs reality at Camp Greenlake, as well as the intricate relationships between the campmates and their pasts.



The top year groups this week are: Year 1, Year 4 and Year 5.


Our top spellers this week are Bisma (Year 1) in first place, Disha (Year 4) in second place and Nathan (Year 4) in third place.

A new UK government campaign hopes to encourage young people to 'respect, protect and enjoy' the countryside. The campaign follows new research from Natural England, which shows that 80% of children and young people agreed that looking after the environment was important to them, and 83% said they wanted to do more to look after nature and wildlife. The well-known cartoon character, Shaun the Sheep is the new face of the Countryside Code.
